The often cited reason given for their non-recognition is that they never reached the operational area. However, the logic of that argument fails to impress when the ship or ships in which they were serving *was allotted for service from the last port of call to the first port of call upon return*.


National Academy of Sciences – Institute of Medicine. *Veterans and Agent Orange*. The latest volume of this publication was released late June 2016. This is the 10th volume in the series which dates back to 1994. The National Academy of Sciences – Institute of Medicine celebrated its 150th anniversary in 2014 so it's been around for quite a while. Foremost amongst its pages are the 18 diseases, illnesses or syndromes which may be attributed to exposure to Agent Orange. Compare this if you will with the Seven (7) diseases, illnesses or syndromes the Repatriation Medical Authority (RMA) in Australia recognise at the moment. It would appear that the RMA have done nothing further towards addressing this obvious problem since 2006, despite our best efforts.

History Teachers Association Conference. As part of my involvement with the VVAA Education Team I attended the History Teachers Association Conference at Flemington Racecourse on 20 July. The Education Team put on a presentation at the conference titled *We Were There*. 25 teachers attended our session which was interrupted by a false alarm and subsequent evacuation of the whole site.
